### Corporate Plan & Review — the new association

Work on the changed LAA is progressing smoothly. Comments have been received on the decisions made by General Council in June. Most of these centred around the name and there was considerable support for the suggested Australian Library and Information Association, which spurred on the decision to insert the questionnaire in *InCite*. Other areas to attract comment were the objects and resolution to no longer include the *ALJ* as part of the membership package. Council will address these issues in November, but in the meantime work has been done on setting the membership fees for 1987 and comment has been sought on the role of General Council. A revised procedure for handling special grants has been set up and ideas for new services are being sought on the actual mechanism for changing the name and objects.

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### CAPL — Queensland

Approximately 40 people attended a public meeting held in Brisbane's Migrant Resource Centre in support of the Commonwealth Assistance for Public Libraries (CAPL) campaign focusing on multi-cultural library services.

Guest speaker Derek Whitehead, Chairperson of the Victorian Working Party on Multi-cultural Library Services, presented a paper highlighting 6 reasons why public libraries should be providing materials and services in other languages.

Mrs E.B. Lyons, Principal Librarian of the Public Libraries Service, State Library of Queensland and Ms Anna Raunik, former Ethnic Services Librarian at State Library of Queensland also gave papers looking at the local situation and historical development of the State Library Collection.

It was pleasing to note the attendance of Ben Humphreys, Federal Member for Griffith, Ann Warner, State ALP Member for Quilpie, Tim Quinn, a local Alderman, and Dulcie Turnbull representing the Lord Mayor of Brisbane. We hope to be enlisting their support for the campaign in the future.

Two resolutions were passed by the meeting — one supporting the campaign in general terms and empowering the newly formed Working Group on Multi-cultural Library Services (Qld) to follow up on much of the lobbying. The second involved stepping up lobbying for the appointment of an Ethnic Services Librarian in the State Library which was seen as an important priority within Queensland.
