

School Library Automation, the proceedings of a conference held last year, was launched in Perth a few weeks ago.

The proceedings were edited by Dr Anne Clyde, Head of the Department of Library Studies at Western Australian College, and organiser of the conference. The twelve papers in the volume cover the use of computers in school library management, and computer hardware and software in the school library as educational resources.

Success in Moscow

Baker & Taylor report that their first ever cooperative book exhibit at the Moscow International Book Fair was a success, with people eager to examine the nearly 1,800 US titles in the Baker & Taylor booth. Over 250,000 people attended the week-long event, making it one of the largest book fairs held anywhere. Exhibitors representing publishers from 100 countries showed books of all types and categories.

The Baker & Taylor booth, featuring titles from 191 participating publishers, was the largest exhibit of US books. The greatest areas of interest seemed to be art and photography, handicrafts, fashion, health and fitness, children's, and military science. Soviet publishers expressed rights interest in more than 100 of the titles. All rights inquiries have been forwarded to the appropriate US publishers.

ABN/CLIRS link

A forthcoming link between ABN and CLIRS will provide ABN users with access to the full text of the principal acts and law reports of the Commonwealth, Victoria and New South Wales. And later this year to similar material from Tasmania and South Australia.

CLIRS users will now have access to the ABN data which includes over four million bibliographic records and over four million locations for material held in Australian libraries. The bibliographic records include files from the Library of Congress and the Australian, British, Canadian and New Zealand national bibliographies, as well as over 300,000 records contributed by libraries participating in the Australian Bibliographic Network.
