This is one way of creating and fostering ace and international understanding among ung people — one of the main aims of IBBY id particularly relevant in this 1986 Interitional Year of Peace. Reading books written people from other countries allows child-n to learn of other cultures regardless of ce, colour or creed.

Each year a different national section of BY is invited to sponsor International Childn's Book Day. The sponsoring nation process a poster designed by an outstanding ustrator of children's books and a message ritten by a distinguished author for distriction to all member nations. To date the folwing nations have been sponsors of this day Britain, USA, Sweden, Denmark, Iran, Yuslavia, France, Austria, Germany, Czechovakia, Bulgaria, Poland, Cyprus, Brazil, nezuela and Australia.

### **AEI Users' Course**

The Editors of the Australian Education Index have decided to hold a users course this year. The aim is to bring users up-to-date with developments to the database and publications, and in doing so respond to numerous enquiries received about them.

AEI scans approximately 350 Australian periodicals, 500 overseas periodicals, 1,000 books, reports, collections, tests and monographs each year. In addition, the database of over 25,000 records includes 1,350 thesis entries.

## Information at your fingertips

The Erindale Centre Library (Canberra) has installed a CCS (IBM compatible) microcomputer to handle community information needs. The computer will be used to maintain up-to-date information files and mailing lists for local community groups. Software was selected to be as easy to use as possible as members of the local community will be given access for database and wordprocessing applications.

The equipment was purchased through a CEP grant and a CEP employee has been trained to enter data which will be updated and used as required by community groups.

The computer will be made available to public users generally, as part of the Library's plan to make computing facilities available to all.
