ACHLIS Progress

The Australian Clearing House for Library and Information Science (ACHLIS) has recently published the 1986 volume of Australian Library and Information Science Abstracts (ALISA).

There have been some problems in getting ALISA 86 out due to the volume of material received in the year but with nearly 1,000 fully abstracted entries it is the biggest volume yet. ALISA 87 should be out in May 1988, well in time to show overseas IFLA delegates that Australia has a more comprehensive and systematic coverage of its library and information science documentation than any other country!

A new breed

A new breed of historian is being sought by employers to write contract histories, vet policy decisions, research historic celebrations and design building conservation strategies. Monash University is gearing up to become a major centre for training these new historians with its Masters course in public history. The first of its kind in Australia, the course will be offered next year. Although the course is designed for history graduates, local history librarians, museum curators etc may find they want to experience and benefit from Monash's brave new historical world. 'Nutcote' fundraising to continue

The May Gibbs Foundation will continue fund raising even though the owners of 'Nutcote', the Neutral Bay home of the late May Gibbs, have withdrawn their offer to sell the property to the Foundation. 'Nutcote', 5 Wallaringa Avenue, where May Gibbs lived from 1926 until her death in 1969, is allegedly owned by Invergowrie Properties.

The company's Managing Director, Mr Peter Skerrett, told the Foundation on 19 October that hewas withdrawing his offer to sell the property to the Foundation as he now intends to live there with his family and restore the home. The Foundation is continuing discussions with Mr Skerrett to seek assurances that it will have first opportunity to buy the property should it come back on the market.

Dr Neil Shand, Chairman of the May Gibbs Foundation, says he will continue with the fundraising efforts with the same objective of acquiring the May Gibbs property. 'Until the property comes on the market again, money raised will be held in trust although some funds may be used to acquire additional May Gibbs memorabilia. This is not the end of our campaign as we will continue to raise funds so we can acquire the property when it comes back on the market and continue to acquire memorabilia for our museum', he said.

The Foundation is thinking about housing a professionally created May Gibbs exhibition in a bookmobile to travel around various regions.
