historical resources.

Speakers during the evening represented various groups and the interests of the diverse audience. Gail Griffith, Executive Officer, Affiliated Societies (Royal Australian Historical Society) introduced Nick Vine-Hall, Executive Director, Society of Australian Genealogists; Peter Orlovitch from the School of Librarianship, University of NSW; Ian Jack, from the Dept of History, Sydney University; Dr Carol Liston, Historian and Convenor, Affiliated Societies Sub-committee; and Dr Peter Spearritt, from the Dept of History, Macquarie University (Convenor, Bicentennial National Historic Records Search Program) to the meeting respectively.

Nick Vine-Hall took to the rostrum first and commented on the current surge of interest in things historical and the demand that this interest is putting on institutions holding historical resources. The new section will help to form an appropriate new organised national approach to helping the public find and use historical resources.

Peter Orlovitch spoke about the role of the Action Committee on Local Government Records in the creation of policies for preserving the archives of local government. The creation of the Local Studies Section is the next step and it will play an important role in giving access to resources and in creating adequate facilities for reception, storage and use of documents.

Ian Jack drew the audience's attention to

the current 'Bicentennial fever'. He commented that it will take 'flair and far-sighted planning' to make projects begun during 1987-88 continue after 1988. Groups such as the new section will be fundamental to the 'after 88 thrust'.

Carol Liston spoke on the relationship that can exist between local history librarian and other groups, such as local historical societies and professional historians. Pete Spearritt gave a brief account of his involvement in the Historic Record Search and outlined the focus of the program.

This concluded the first part of the evening and the election of office bearers took place. The following people were elected:

Margaret Wyatt, the new National President and catalyst of the group, ended the evening by thanking the speakers and by giving special thanks to Pat Ward, Diana Oliver, Jenny Adams and Sue Phillips for their help and advice. She also outlined the priorities of the new section as being concerned with identifying the role of local studies librarians and setting up a network of support. She remarked that as far as the work, enthusiasm and commitment of the new section is concerned 'it's only the beginning'.

National Library fire

Readers may remember the lengthy article by my predecessor on the National Library fire in *InCite*, 26 April 1985. The cause of the fire was a matter of great interest to the Australian library community, and Mr Bryan said at the time that it was subject to a coronial inquiry and the library would comment further when it could.

This inquiry finished late last year with the coroner making an open finding on the cause of the commencement of the fire, saying that it could not be established. He found no suspicious circumstances or evidence of foul play. His conclusion was that the fire commenced

in the roof cavity area of the upper level of the National Library in an area where asbestos removal was taking place, but that any more precise comments were speculative.

We know from inquiries to the library that there has been considerable interest in the Australian library community about any lessons we have learnt from the fire, and in particular what we have since done about counter-disaster planning measures. Dr Jan Lyall, Director, Preservation Services Branch is therefore preparing a comment on this for circulation to major libraries and other interested parties in the near future.
