LAA Program Highlights

The LAA program has been designed to be of interest to both local and overseas conference participants. Concurrent sessions cover five broad themes: industrial relations, management, education, technology and national policy issues. The diverse range of speakers will make this a highly innovative and stimulating program.

Special features in the LAA program include the Hypothetical, the Sound and Light finale and the Round Table sessions. The Hypothetical panel session a la Geoffrey Robinson will explore the issue of a roving computer bug randomly destroying data. In the collective hot seat will be Warren Horton, Des Tellis, John Levett, Diana Killen, Dorothy Peake, Ian McCallum, Carmel Maguire, Naida Tattersall, Helen Meredith, David Lewis, John Bennett, Dr Allan Pattison, George Walker and Rodney Cavalier. The compere will be Stephen Matchett.

The Round Table sessions are a new feature for the LAA and they cater for small groups of approximately 20 participants. The sessions provide a high degree of flexibility in the method of presentation as the speaker or the moderator will introduce the topic and then lead the discussion. The sessions will cover topics such as: 'Role of teacher librarians', 'Innovative users of microcomputers in school libraries', 'International exchange', 'Changing perspective of work and power in libraries', 'Information for independent living', 'Automated serials control in special libraries' and 'Public libraries: then and now'.

The LAA program will conclude with a Sound and Light finale which will be held in the Concert Hall at the Sydney Opera House. This show will contain highlights of the development of the library and information profession in Australia and will provide the stimulus and excitement to take the profession forward for the next hundred years.

Exhibition news

The IFLA/LAA Trade Exhibition will be the place to be at lunchtime and before and after conference sessions. Delegates can come back to relax at the exhibition via the Baker and Taylor mini-buses. A bus stop will be located outside the John Clancy Auditorium and the Round House. The route to be followed will be reproduced in the Conference Handbook and delegates 'between stops' will be able to hail buses to hitch a ride.

Free coffee will be available at the exhibition, with free wine and cheese served during lunchtime. The range of products and services on show makes this exhibition extra special.

Don't forget to linger longer at the stands of conference sponsors who have helped to bring about this event. At the James Bennett Library Services (JBLS) stand you can meet members of their enthusiastic team. JBLS is not just
