Australian Capital Territory

Bicycles and bushwalks

In Canberra, groups dedicated to the preservation of Canberra's cultural, historical and environmental heritage, form the major exhibition of the week — the Albert Hall exhibition, from Saturday 16 April — Tuesday 19 April. Our National Capital is turning on around 60 activities for Heritage Week including Jazz at the Hyperdome, a National Trust Bushdance, 'Shades of Light' — a National Gallery Photography display 1839-1988; 'People, Print and Paper' exhibition at the National Library; 'Historic Bikes' — Canberra Bicycle Museum; 'Sail, Song and Shackle' — Belconnen Library as well as visits to historic sites, bushwalks, guided tours and excursions. The National Library is also conducting tours of the Library. The tours cover Asian studies, manuscripts, maps, music, newspapers and microforms, oral history and pictorial collections. Starlight showcase

The main event for Heritage Week in Queensland will be the 'Starlight Showcase '88' concert. The official opening of Heritage Week will be performed by the Premier, the Hon. M.J. Ahern, MLA just prior to the concert which is on Sunday 17 April at 7.00 pm at Old Government House. Strutting their stuff at the free concert will be the Ipswich Cambrian Youth Choir, Conservatorium Wind Ensemble, Soprano Patricia Kelly, special spectacle of 72 dancers presenting a multi-coloured squaredance demonstration as well as various other performers. The concert is free.

From Monday 18 April to Friday 22 April there will be displays and demonstrations in the Queen Street Mall by Queensland quilters; the embroiderers guild; Queensland spinners, weavers and dyers; the lace guild; and the Australian Conservation Foundation. For those tracing their ancestors the Genealogical Society of Queensland will be in the Elizabeth Street level of Wintergarden on the Mall and the Queensland Family History Group will be in the City Plaza throughout the week.

Also from Monday through to Friday there will be lunch time entertainment at the Rotunda in the Mall by various theatre groups, brass bands and choirs. The Lord Mayor, Alderman Sallyanne Atkinson will officially launch 'Heritage Week in Brisbane' at the Rotunda on Monday at 12.30 pm.

On Sunday 17 April and Sunday 24 April, the Brisbane History Group will be running the 'Brisbane Heritage 1988 Bus Tour'. An informative guide book is included in the cost as well as commentary by an experienced tour guide. Victoria has an exciting range of activities for Heritage Week with over 300 displays, walks, tours, workshops, and special events being offered all over the state, from Bairnsdale to Bendigo, from Wangaratta to Warragul.

On Sunday 17 April, Melbourne will be turning back the clock in Collins Street. All the colour and vitality of 'Marvellous Melbourne' will be created — there'll be horse-drawn vehicles, vintage trams, street entertainers, and the city's biggest ever street market.

You are also invited to a Victorian Garden Party with the mistress of the house, servants and a few charity cases from the female penitentiary. In Port Melbourne, visit the former mission to seamen building and enjoy its art gallery, bookshop, archival films and displays, or take a trip to Cohuna and experience the memories of pioneer women through photographs and other memorabilia.

For the not so faint-hearted, a tour of the Ballarat 'New' Cemetery, gazetted in 1867, will focus on some of Ballarat's notables. And

while in Ballarat, browse through private collections of photographs of the district at the Mining Exchange.

But, if you just feel like totally indulging in nostalgia the Heritage Film Festival is for you — at the famous Capital Cinema in Swanston Street, Melbourne. the preservation and promotion of the history of steam.



One of the main events of the Steamfest in WA will be a steam train journey from Perth and from Boyanup in the South-West to Yarloop on Sunday 17 April. The 'triple-header' steam train will carry passengers including His Excellency, the Governor, on Board, on a journey in to the past. Some 2,000 people are expected to travel on several steam locomotives on this day.

At Perth City Station, there will be an all-day program of exhibitions and displays which can be enjoyed after the official departure of the 'triple-header'. A weekend program of events will be taking place at Yarloop, the site of the first Steam Workshops in Western Australia, including square dancing, wood turning, a mini circus and much more.

Other activities during this festive week include a turn of the century back-to-school at the turn of the century program at the Museum of Western Australia, and don't forget the Turner Cottage at Serpentine puts on a first class display during this week. If you're going to be in Kalgoorlie, don't miss the Golden Mile Loop Line railway. And if you happen to be at the other end of the state at Rottnest Island, don't miss the guided tours.

free to libraries in all local government areas throughout Australia. Researchers including members of the general public will have access to the register through these libraries and other major libraries and archives. To protect their privacy, owners will be able to withhold their names and addresses from public listing.

Field officers finish their terms on 30 April, after which time the production phase will begin, ready for the distribution of fiche in December. Owners of the records listed in the register will be given a certificate of recognition and information on how to preserve their valuable records.

The ABC's new Social History Unit will co-ordinate a Nationwide series of programs about the Search to be broadcast over ABC regional radio stations over the next 12 months. Together with the field officers they will present programs based on some of the records found in each region, promoting the aims of the search and providing an invaluable communication line throughout the nation.

And so, through projects such as this search, Australians will begin to realise that the papers they generate today are the historic records of the future.
