Visit to USIS Library

The United States Information Service (USIS) librarians, Rosemary Dickson (Country Librarian) and Roslyn Orr (Canberra Reference Librarian), gave an interesting insight into their Canberra-based Library at a recent meeting organised at the Library by the Group.

As well as accessing traditional online systems, USIS has access to LEGISLATE and PDQ Index.

LEGISLATE (a full-text database) is used to give information on legislation before Congress. In particular, it gives details of when bills are introduced and a history of their journey through Congress. It also gives details of the voting performance of each Member of Congress, their committee responsibilities, and a ranking by lobby groups of their political leanings. LEGISLATE is updated every 24 hours, so the information is guaranteed to be up to date.

PDQ Index is an online index to the Wireless file. It is very useful for locating information on US policy on a range of issues. As with most online files, you can either print the full text online, or just the reference if you have access to the hard copy.

Apart from LEGISLATE and PDQ Index, USIS also has a link with the US Information Agency's (USIA) Worldnet television network. When USIA is not transmitting a Worldnet program, air time is devoted to broadcasting C-Span - a domestic US channel broadcasting proceedings of the House of Representatives and live public affairs programming including Congressional hearings, speeches and occasional press conferences on Capitol Hill and at various US government departments.

Demand to visit USIS was greater than expected, so Rosemary and Roslyn have agreed to repeat the demonstrations later this year.

National Group

Forthcoming AGM

The motions to be put to the forthcoming AGM (Adelaide Convention Centre, Wednesday 9 August 1989, 4 pm) are:

That the roster of national committees/conference organisation agreed to at the 1985 AGM shall be changed so that Queensland and the ACT shall be transposed for one occasion

only so that the ACT members shall be responsible for forming the national committee between 1990 and 1991 and Queensland members shall be responsible for forming the committee in 1992 and 1993.

- That the Trust Deed prepared by Minter Ellison Solicitors (REF; NJOB;450625:PMS) should be accepted.
- That from Volume 22, No. 1 1990 the title of Australian Special Libraries News (ASLN) be changed to Australian Special Libraries (ASL).
- That in view of the reduced allocation of funds from ALIA head office to local groups the National Special Libraries Section consider allocating funds to State Special Libraries groups for specific purposes.

The first two motions may require some explanation. At a previous AGM, a roster of States/Territories responsible for the National Committee was accepted and has been in force for several years. However, the 1987 AGM decided that the State/Territory providing the National Committee would also organise the Conference in its own State/ Territory. As a result of this decision, the next State/Territory on the roster was Oueensland. However, the Queensland Section Executive felt it would not be a good idea for the Conference to return to Queensland so soon after the 1987 Conference. The next State/Territory on the roster is the ACT, and so the first motion proposes a revision of the roster to lengthen the time until the next Brisbane Conference.

The second motion is the result of a decision at the 1987 AGM. Asmall group was convened to formulate suggestions for the use of money generated by the 1987 Conference Committee for a proposed 'Australian Special Libraries Travel Trust Fund'. A draft trust deed for the formation of this fund has been prepared and copies are available on request. At the AGM it will be necessary to decide whether this will proceed.

In summary, the purpose of the trust fund is to provide annual grants for:

- '(i) financial assistance to individuals in meeting travel, accommodation or educational expenses in undertaking study in Australia or overseas; or
- (ii) financial assistance in the establishment of educational courses, including continuing educational courses in relation to Special Libraries.'

Such grants would not be limited to members of the Special Libraries Section (SLS) of ALIA, and the trust deed



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does allow these purposes to be changed if the trustees consider that the aims have been met or cannot be met.

The trust deed states that there should be more than two trustees but less than four and that they hold office until they resign, die or are removed by the SLS Executive. As no travel funds are available from the trust fund, the trustees would in practice need to be from the same State.

As these matters will be of considerable concern to SLS members, the National Committee felt that Section members should have an opportunity to consider the motions before the meeting.

Library Technicians' Section

NSW Group

The Annual General Meeting of the Library Technicians' Section (NSW Group) was held at the State Library of NSW on 22 June, 1989. Following official business, a panel discussion on the equivalency of library technicians' qualifications was conducted, with guest speakers Louise Lansley, former Educational and Industrial Services Manager, ALIA; Eric Wainwright, Chairperson, Board of Education, ALIA; Mairead Browne, Head, School of Information and Library Studies, Kuringgai CAE; and Kaye Barrett, Head, Division of Library Practice, NSW Dept of TAFE.

We hope to bring you a more detailed report of this pertinent issue in

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future issues of *Lib Tec*, the newsletter of our Section. However, for those of you who were unable to attend the meeting, and are concerned about its content, a summary of the equivalency discussion follows.

Louise Lansley spoke about the history and background of the problem, and how the LAA Board of Education became involved from 1988. Two of its initiatives were to try to inform employers that LAA considered that both the Technicians Certificate and the Associate Diploma were minimum requirements for admission to the Technicians' Section of LAA, and to encourage employers to make eligibility for Library Technician membership of LAA an essential requirement when advertising jobs for technicians.

Eric Wainwright pointed out that technicians need to focus on several main areas in addressing the issue of equivalency. They need to find a way to combine present, past and future learning processes to ensure that Certificate holders are not disadvantaged by the new title for the award of Associate Diploma; they should make sure the qualifications are easily and equally transferable throughout Australia; and a way must be devised to foster equal acceptance by employers of the Certificate course, as the Associate Diploma course appears to be regarded as a higher qualification.

Mairead Browne addressed the question of course articulation, and explained how major constraints are imposed on institutions by federal bodies as to how much advanced standing can be given for previous study. Also each organisation has its unique value set which influences its response to accepting other qualifications, and these factors have contributed to the many different perceptions in various areas of education as to what the articulation for technician qualifications should be.

Kaye Barrett, by using material from TAFE handbooks, demonstrated conclusively that the Associate Diploma in Library Practice is equivalent to the Library Technicians Certificate. She suggested that the Library Practice Course that was available prior to 1982 did not contain enough automated content to be considered equivalent to the current course. With a view to converting the Library Practice Certificate to the Associate Diploma in Library Practice, an updated course will be available from technical colleges in 1990, requiring 6 hours per week over 36 weeks and proof of 400 hours' library work experience.

At this stage there is no vehicle for

converting a Library Technicians Certificate to an Associate Diploma in Library Practice, but it may possibly be considered in the TAFE update of 1993.

Some consensus will hopefully come from this.

The Literacy Section, Queensland Group, has now received official ALIA approval and a keen group is now working on projects connected with the Year of the Reader and International Literacy Year.

The southern winter is sending lots of technicians our way for the National Conference at the Gold Coast late in July. As a spin-off from the Conference, we look forward to an evening meeting with Eric Wainwright, who will address collection assessment. Keep planning winter excursions to Queensland; the weather is perfect!

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
