

# Status of Women in Librarianship

Special Interest Group

#### **EEO** policy

Issues affecting the employment considerations of many women emerged as the most significant theme of a meeting held recently by the Status of Women in Librarianship (SOWIL) Group. The need to locate these issues within a deeper understanding of women's various and changing roles, responsibilities and needs is seen as crucial in the development of any Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) policy.

'EEO: still a lot to be desired policy, practice, strategies, sabotage' was the title of the public meeting held at St Kilda Library on 26 June and attended by about twenty people. The two guest speakers - each experienced in the EEO policy and program area — were Catherine Cole, presently with the Municipal Officers' Association, and Trish Rogers, formerly the EEO Officer with the Victorian Department of Property and Services.

Both speakers offered substantial descriptions and interpretations of their work contexts and roles and the implementation of EEO policy and strategies within large organisations and departments. A fair degree of common ground was covered, including some of the shortcomings and barriers to effectiveness. Both Catherine and Trish have been involved in training programs to encourage practical skills in areas such as assertiveness and interview techniques. Yet both emphasised the inadequacy of these measures if not implemented in conjunction with structural (and philosophical) changes.

Local government was identified as the most sex-segregated area of the public sector, where women predominate in the libraries and community services and men are the engineers and town clerks. Local government is not covered in the Affirmative Action Act, and in Victoria, where Councils with more than forty staff are required to have an EEO program, there are no reporting or accountability measures.

The Victorian Public Service Action

Plan was presented in its historical context of the developments in the late 1970s and early 80s. Trish Rogers identified the most inhibiting barriers to women's promotion and movement as being systemic ones involving work practices, the structure of work, and job categories. Work value is the area that needs the greatest attention.

The achievements of the Plan were also outlined—the appointment of EEO Officers and Consultative Committees, the revision of selection processes, the 50 per cent women's quota in training courses, the introduction of permanent part-time work and the recognition of work-based sexual harassment. The focus on processes at the expense of impact and outcome measures was regarded as a severe limitation, and one that may be redressed by the 1988 Plan. Incentives to management to achieve EEO goals (political kudos, peer approval, performance pay) are, however, unfortunately lacking in the present climate.

Both speakers emphasised child care as an inescapably central issue affecting the employment considerations of many women. The past 10 years have seen little improvement in the provision of child-care services. Governments have shown little interest in child care as an issue. Both Catherine and Trish empha-

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sised the union arena as the one to focus on, and see award restructuring as offering a significant avenue for women to voice their needs and have them formalised as union policy, especially as regards equity issues and the possibility of work-based child care.


