It is open to any member of the Association's Library Technicians' Section who holds a recognised technician qualification. Nominations may be made by members or divisions of the Association or employers. They close on 1 June each year.

Jean Bailey has, in a remarkably short period of time, made a significant contribution to the promotion of the role and image of library technicians and to the Library Technicians Section of the Australian Library and Information Association.

After a long and successful career in the nursing profession in the United Kingdom and Australia, Jean Bailey embarked upon full-time library technician studies in 1985, completed her qualifications, and entered the University of Sydney Library as a General Library Assistant in 1986. She gained both technical and reader services experience in two initial positions, and was in 1987 appointed to the newly established position of Collection Maintenance Officer in the Lending Services Department. As head of the Shelving Section, Jean Bailey inherited a staff of eighteen full-time and five part-time General Library Assistants, much staff dissatisfaction and absenteeism, and a backlog of approximately 33 000 volumes awaiting reshelving.

A difficult and onerous project, the re-organisation and development of Fisher Shelving Services according to a broad-based participatory management plan was indeed a challenge - a challenge that was multi-faceted, quantitative and qualitative, mechanical and human.

Jean Bailey met her tasks with outstanding work skill, acumen, integrity, creativity and indomitable spirit. After 2 years hard work and dedication, she left, in fully functional order, a reorganised and enlarged section of thirty-three staff, to join the Technical

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The shelving Review Planning document and her final submission to senior management recommending future plans and actions for the efficient operation of the section have ensured continuing impact of her perceptions and recommendations.

Jean Bailey has had substancial pactical involvement in promoting and ecouraging professional development for library technicians, both within her institution and outside. She supported the extension/conversion of Library Assitant positions to Library Technician gades and encouraged staff to attend development activities. On a wider sale, she has participated on selection pinels at the State Library of New South Vales and the New South Wales Depirtment of TAFE Libraries.

As a tireless member of the ALIA Lbrary Technicians' Section, NSW Goup, Jean Bailey has been editor of LbTec (1986—1988), Vice-President (988) and is currently President as well a convener of the 'Aims & Objectives' and 'Summit Review' subcommittees. In 1988 she was guest speaker on the 'lole of the Library Technician' at the Shool of Library and Information Studies, Kuring-gai CAE, and a speaker at the IFLA/LAA Conference.

Jean Bailey has had considerable siccess in ensuring a high profile for library technicians, and her contribution as a model for the actual and potential role of the library technician, bth within a complex library and information environment, that specific vorkforce and in the wider community, highlight a remarkably effective syle.

As such Jean Bailey is a worthy recpient of the Australian Library and Information Association's Library Techrcian of the Year Award for 1989.
