Information Online 89

NFORMATION Online 89, held in Sydney from 17-19 January, attracted well over delegates, speakers and exhibitors, a very good attendance after the major events of 1988. Information Online 89 saw significant differences in the nature of the program and in the composition of the exhibition over previous years as the online industry has evolved.

Keynote Addresses

This evolution was also reflected in the Keynote Addresses, by:

- Phil Ruthven, Executive Chairman of the IBIS Group, who forecast 'stunning' growth in the quaternary, informationbased sector of the Australian economy, much of that growth coming from services provided to the household market;
- Jacob Bar, of the Israeli Industry Center for Research and Development, who stressed the need for better mutual understanding between consumers and vendors of databases, and the need to provide added value, i.e. solutions to clients' problems rather than just the raw data or information;
- Barrie Stern, Director of the ADONIS Project, who gave a fascinating insight into future document supply trends.

Other sessions included the popular Made in Australia, the packaging and marketing of databases, Digging It Outland and natural resources information, Making Money, Expert Systems,

Networking, and Data Distribution and Communication.

User service a conference

A major focus of the conference was serving users more effectively. This was illustrated in particular by the session Straight From The Bar in which three Supreme Court Justices presented their views on the information needs of the

Since the inception of Information Online, those of us responsible for developing the program deliberately sought speakers who are not necessarily librarians, but who speak well and are able to provoke, stimulate and inform conference delegates.

We have thus welcomed professionals from many other fields, despite difficulties in locating suitable speakers. We believe this has paid dividends in both broadening the perspective of information professionals and opening links with others to help them understand our professional role in information services.

We believe that the future role of librarians is very much dependent on our willingness to explore new forms of information and take an active role in providing access to them.

It was interesting to note in this context that over 300 people attended the session on CD-ROM, a fascinating medium for relatively dated information, whereas only 45 chose the parallel international session on real-time

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financial information—up to the minute, non-bibliographic, expensive information, vital to many parts of business and the Australian economy.

In summing up, David Batty placed the papers given in three categories: those which reviewed the state of the art and current practice in the online industry; those which looked critically and imaginatively at the future development and use of online services Australasia; and those which emphasised a more realistic, economic framework for the development of the online industry.

Exhibition and new products

The Exhibition in 1989 saw a number of new exhibitors, such as IBIS Business Information and the Database Promotion Center, Japan, and others returned who have been exhibiting since 1986. Most exhibitors reported keen public and delegate interest in product displays and their demonstrations.

The conference also provided the venue for the launch of a number of significant publications and products, including:

- the 1988 Directory of Australian and New Zealand Databases, prepared by the Australian Database Development Association and launched by Warren Horton, Director-General of the National Library of Australia;
- volume 1 of Australia's Library, Information and Archive Services—an encyclopaedia of practice and practitioners, edited by Harrison Bryan, produced by the ALIA, sponsored by Kilners, and launched by the Hon. Kevin Rozzoli, Speaker of the NSW Legislative Assembly;
- the Australian ADONIS project, operated by the National Library of Australia in Canberra.
