BY now you will have received your letter from Averill Edwards, ALIA President for 1989, telling you of the name change for your Association. After several years of hard work and persistence, we are now the **AUSTRALIAN LIBRARY AND INFORMATION ASSOCIATION**.

The Governor-General of Australia, Sir Ninian Stephen, on 31 December 1988, approved the LAA's application for a Supplementary Royal Charter.

Initially, this will mean that until the By-Laws are also approved by the Governor-General, the Association can adopt only its new name. Once the By-Laws are approved, the other changes can also be adopted. This should be finalised by mid-1989.

With the change in the procedure for the granting of Royal Charters in Australia, the Association had to re-draft its original Royal Charter. So that you may see first hand this new Charter, it is being published in its entirety on the centre pages of this first issue of *InCite* for 1989.
