Public Libraries Section Queensland Branch

The Public Libraries Section (Qld Branch), recently held a CD-ROM information night targeting those librarians who needed general basic information on CD-ROMs in preparation for introducing this format into the library. It was encouraging to see such a large number of members attending the session on new technology. Brian Sanborn, from the State Library of Queensland, discussed hardware requirements and developments, information sources for CD-ROM managers and users, and the CD-ROM services provided by the State Library.

Geraldine Massey, teacher-librarian from St Paul's School, Bald Hills, described her experiences with CD-ROM, and in particular her management of the format for school users. Particular programs such as Groliers, McGraw-Hill, and Supermap were discussed with reference to their userfriendliness and usage.

Kathy Grgic from QUT Kedron Park Campus Resource Centre, demonstrated BIP and PC-SIG as two examples of technical services and public access CD-ROMs. The evening was a success, particularly as librarians, technicians and students from State, local, tertiary and school libraries all attended and had valuable input to the discussion.



Award restructuring continues to be a focus for 1990 and currently the Working Party on Award Restructuring is attempting to gather information about which unions cover librarians and other library employees across Victoria.

The resource implications of the VCE (Victorian Certificate of Education) on libraries in all sectors is a cause for some concern with students turning to a wide range of information providers to meet their resource needs. Branch Council will continue to provide information to appropriate bodies and to keep open channels of communication for our members and their libraries.

Cataloguers' Section (National Group) Call for Nominations

Nominations are now called for the following position: ALIA Member of the Australian Committee on Cataloguing (1991-1993).

The Australian Committee on Cataloguing is composed of representatives of ALIA, ACLIS and the National Library. It is the primary Australian forum for discussion of cataloguing issues and for representation of Australian views on cataloguing matters to international bodies. Each ALIA representative on the Committee is elected for a 3year term by members of the Cataloguers' Section.
