ALIA Study Grant Award

In 1991 the recipient of the ALIA Study Grant Award was
Carla Mellor, Library Services Manager, SA Department of Agriculture

THE GRANT ENABLED Carla to visit agricultural library and information centres in the USA, Britain and Italy. The centres chosen were: in the USA, University of California, Davis; National Agricultural Library, Washington; and Cornell University, Ithaca; in the UK, the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, and the Commonwealth Agricultural Bureaux International; in Italy, the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation.

Carla aimed to identify information trends and services in these library and information centres and networks, study international models, look at libraries to get layout and design ideas that might suit the proposed agricultural information facility on the Waite campus, and establish professional links with overseas colleagues.

She noticed a number of interesting trends in the management of these services, including

- promotion of activities to the wider library community and to the public;

- raising revenue from outside sources;
- the availability of more research funding for projects such as preservation;
- the use of more formalised/management principles in conducting library business;
- the library becoming a revenue centre rather than a cost centre;
- development of more formalised collection development policies;
- an increasing tendency to contract out services.

Technology was an integral part of library service, for example the centres were producing both in-house and commercially marketed CD-ROMs of their own collections, using commercial databases on their library hardware, and using bulletin board services and national and international networks to inform their users.

Service ethics were a conspicuous feature, particularly in the USA. It was recognised that the prime purpose of a library was to provide a service to clients, not merely to make available a collection to them.
