Call for nominations

Membership of the Board of Education is as follows:

- three professional members elected by the Professional Committee of General Council;
- seven members, of whom at least four must be professional members, elected by the membership-at-large of the Association;
- the President of the Association ex officio;
- the Executive Director as a nonvoting executive member (Bylaw 24).

The terms of office of three members of the Board end on 31 December 1992. Two members are now to be elected by the membership of the Association to hold office until 31 December 1995. The Professional Committee of General Council will elect the third member.

Nominations are hereby called for the two positions. Nominees must be personal financial members of the Association, however they need not be professional members.

Nominations shall be:

- in writing;
- signed by two personal financial members of the Association;
- countersigned by the nominee;
- accompanied by a curriculum vitae (giving full details of academic and professional qualifications) and a statement of concerns. The curriculum vitae should be arranged under the headings of Present Position, Previous Positions Professional Activities. The curriculum vitae and the statement of concerns should each not be more than 100 words.

Nominations close at 5pm on 1 September 1992 and should be sent to the Executive Director, Australian Library and Information Association, PO Box E441, Queen Victoria Terrace, ACT 2600.

Board members retiring on 31 December 1992 are Jean Bailey, Joyce Kirk and Vicki Williamson.

New policy on libraries

Des Stephens draws our attention to recent **Queensland Labor Party policy statements**

HE QUEENSLAND Labor Party has recently released copies of its Social Platform, which encompasses the Arts, including several policy statements about libraries.

These are the five points relating to library

- 1. Labor will give priority to the development and extension of the Division of the State Library responsible for the planning and development of library services and information services for the public.
- Labor will request the State Library Authority to develop state plans for libraries which, after special consultation, take into account the needs of all sections of the community including migrants, Aborigines, teenagers, the aged, the

- handicapped, prisoners, the poor, the hospitalised and workers.
- 3. Labor will fund a data network computerisation program to create equality of access to information on a state-wide
- 4. Labor will work with local authorities to ensure that all public libraries develop library plans. These plans will include an assessment of local needs, goals and objectives, budgets and evaluation procedures.
- 5. Library plans are designed to make libraries more accountable and relevant to the communities they serve.

Des notes that the Queensland Liberal and National parties have not yet released their statements relating to libraries.
