

Achieving the balance

Margaret Butterworth reports on School Libraries Conference '92, Perth 30-31 May

TWO HUNDRED teacher librarians and other school library professionals from all parts of WA attended this conference, which challenged the stereotype of the school library as a book repository. The emphasis is now on the process of learning, on the acquisition of skills rather than on knowledge and content. The school library is seen as a learning workshop, where pupils can develop information handling skills and experience new

technologies.

This year's theme reflected the need for a balance between traditional library services, such as promoting a love of books and reading, with the essential requirement of mastering new technologies which give access to today's information stores.

The conference attracted three keynote speakers of national stature. *Dr Max Angus*, from the WA Ministry of Education, discussed the Finn and Mayer reports, giving a preview of the likely directions for the next round of educational change in Australia. *Brian Caswell*, a teacher and author of children's books, told us how children's literature is evolving. *Dr Roy Lundin*, from Queensland University of Technology, looked at how teleconferencing can alleviate the tyranny of distance and 'the loneliness of the long-distance student'.

The conference was the second organised by SLOC (School Libraries Organisations Council), a body that coordinates the professional development activities of teacher librarians in WA. Proceedings will be ready shortly, gratis to all conference delegates and for \$15.00 plus postage to others. ■
