#### Call for nominations

Membership of the Board of Education is as follows:

- three professional members elected by the Professional Committee of General Council;
- seven members, of whom at least four must be professional members, elected by the membership-at-large of the Association:
- the President of the Association ex officio:
- the Executive Director as a nonvoting executive member (Bylaw 24).

The terms of office of three members of the Board end on 31 December 1992. Two members are now to be elected by the membership of the Association to hold office until 31 December 1995. The Professional Committee of General Council will elect the third member.

Nominations are hereby called for the two positions. Nominees must be personal financial members of the Association, however they need not be professional members.

#### Nominations shall be:

- in writing;

- countersigned by the nominee;
- accompanied by a curriculum vitae (giving full details of academic and professional qualifications) and a statement of concerns. The curriculum vitae should be arranged under the headings of Present Position, Previous Positions and Professional Activities. curriculum vitae and the statement of concerns should each not be more than 100 words.

Nominations close at 5pm on 1 September 1992 and should be sent to the Executive Director, Australian Library and Information Association, PO Box E441, Queen Victoria Terrace, ACT 2600.
