Senior secondary students and library usage: a review of research on the impact of the VCE

Your reviewer looked in vain for a summary or synthesis and there is no bibliography (although there are occasional references to other documents in the text). However this review brings together some varied survey results on how many students used libraries and what for: the State Library, special libraries, tertiary and TAFE libraries, school libraries and public libraries.

Almost half the students sampled use public libraries 'regularly' (more than twice a month), but almost *all* use their school libraries. School libraries rate higher than public libraries in terms of 'convenient opening hours', but are perceived to

do less well in the service they offer (ie., 'obtaining a book from another library'). In general, students who are high library users seem to prefer using their school libraries to public libraries, by a factor of three to one. Some go into a public library just to find a quiet place to study, without using the collection.

This is a first report and Kerry Grosser at RMIT will welcome input of relevant research results into future editions. Published by the ACLIS Victorian Committee, 1992, the 55-page report is available from MONINFO, Monash University Library, Wellington Road, Clayton VIC 3168, price \$29 (\$25 to schools).
