Australian Society of Indexers Medal Award 1992

OR THE FIRST TIME EVER, two indexers have been declared joint winners of the AusSI Medal for the best index to a published work. The panel of judges found it impossible to split the two leading contenders and decided that both entries deserved a medal.

The winners were Max McMaster for his index to Infectious diseases in pregnancy and the newborn infant (G L Gilbert. 1991. Chur, Switzerland: Harwood Academic Publishers. 618p., incl. 40p. index) and Margery Price for her index to The Law Handbook 1992 (Fitzroy Legal Service, Melbourne, 1992). The judges also highly commended Josephine Cardale's index to Insects of Australia (CSIRO Division of Entomology. 1991. University of Melbourne Press. 2 vols, 1172p., incl. 63p. index).
