Exuberant cataloguers meet in Melbourne

OUTSTANDING', 'exuberant', 'participatory', 'lots to think about'—these were some of the comments overheard at the 9th National Cataloguing Conference held on 28-30 November 1991.

Three hundred people from across Australia crowded (and I mean crowded) into the Junior Common Room at Ormond College, Melbourne University for two days of discussion and the examination of the topic of 'Cataloguing for on-line access'.

Undoubtedly the keynote speaker, Michael Gorman, co-editor of AACRII, now at Henry Madden Library, California State University—Fresno, was a big draw-card. His keynote papers on 'Anglo-American Cataloguing Rules in an electronic environment' and 'The future of Cataloguing' were witty and thought provoking.

In the former, we were introduced to his idea of a successor to both MARC and AACRII, HYPERMARC. In the latter, we were assured that there indeed was a future for cataloguing and cataloguers as

many scenarios for information retrieval in the future, e.g. 'Buckland's mighty engine (a colossal amalgamation of catalogues, indexes and bibliographies) presented a number of tricky problems' that cataloguers would be required to resolve.

Other topics covered included record enhancement either by SGML or ESP(!); cataloguing for special collections; the need for references for subject headings; expert systems applied to classification; the change to USMARC; the cataloguers' workstation of the future and organizational issues.

The Proceedings of the Conference will be published in *Cataloguing Australia* Vol 17 Nos 3 & 4. Subscribers will receive these automatically. Individual copies (price \$10 each) can be purchased from Sue Clarke at RMIT Libraries, (03) 660 3107.
