Finally.... a New South Wales TAFE Group

t long last a New South Wales Group of the ALIA National TAFE Section has been formed.

The National TAFE Section, formed in 1985, has always been very active. This encouraged the formation of State Groups in Queensland, South Australia, Victoria (in 1992) and now, in April 1993, in NSW.

The need for a NSW Group was highlighted most recently when States were asked to take an active part in the TAFE libraries lobbying campaign.

The Group will benefit members working in the TAFE sector in NSW and will also



benefit ALIA through increased membership. It will provide an effective and cohesive viewpoint on matters which are of interest to TAFE library staff in NSW. The Group will also promote TAFE interests in ALIA through NSW Branch at State level, and through the TAFE Section at the national level.

At present the NSW Group

plans to continue support for the national TAFE libraries lobbying campaign. It is intended to hold an Annual General Meeting and launch of the Group, possibly at the ALIA National TAFE Libraries Conference in Canberra 28-30 September.

Environment Librarians Network

Roxanne Missingham has just put together its second Newsletter

oxanne reports that librarians are still joining this group and are keen to hear from their colleagues.

This will be an important year for the environment—following the Federal election and changes to state governments. The environment remains an important issue. Changes to environmental information systems and policies indicate that ecologically sustainable development has high priority and will be the subject of more reports and studies.

At the end of last year Merrilyn Chilvers attended a training course in Nairobi on INFOTER-RA, an environmental information network run by the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP). The network uses as its primary instrument of operation the International Directory of Sources of Environmental Information, a database which gives access to more than 6 000 sources of information in over 1 000 environmental subjects.

The Commonwealth Department of the Environment, in its various guises, has been the Australian member, or National Focal Point, to use the INFOTERRA terminology, since its inception after the Stockholm Conference in 1972. Australia has also been designated as a Regional Services Centre for SE Asia and the South Pacific.

There are currently 155 members, from developing and developed nations. Over 24 500 queries were handled by the network in 1991, more than half from developing countries.

Some of the queries which came to Australia were on recycling of lead batteries, treatment of waste water from coal mines, the use of effluent from soya bean curd manufacture, commercial farming of wild animals, urban waste collection, irrigation, salinity in ground water and many relating to air and water quality.
