Lynn Hard sees his new book launched

obin Wallace-Crabbe gave a witty and sensitive speech at the Solander Gallery in Canberra last month to launch a book of poetry by ADFA Librarian Lynn Hard. (Well up to the standard of Lynn's own description of himself on the cover: 'Mr Hard keeps fit by getting up for more ice cubes and nursing grudges.')

Lynn has been deeply involved in support of Australian literature since he took up his post at ADFA. Now he has returned to his own writing and a delightful surprise it turns out to be. Lynn is an enthusiast for jazz, and jazz rhythms come through many of the poems, some lyrical, others tinged with irony or bitterness, all letting us share the special insights that are the gift of the poet's vision.

The title piece is a love song for two blowflies ('Ginger Bodgie and Fred Despair'). Lynn's own choice for a brief quote is the final stanza of a longer poem about sitting on a fence next to a graveyard waiting for a taxi:

The taxi keeps me idling here but I am content with time to seriously consider jumping down from my fence and standing upright so that the sky can stain my hair blue.

Under her guidance HERA has developed into an important research and information tool used by conservationists, researchers and fellow librarians with a wide range of access through Ozline, Australia, CD-ROM and hard copy updates.
