Australian Library Week has become an institution in Darwin, in that it heralds the Annual Book Sale, organised by the Northern Territory Library Service (NTLS).

Each year, hundreds of books which have been withdrawn from the Territory public and community libraries are put on sale for the bargain price of \$2.00 per kilo. With cash register and industrial weighing scales at the ready, staff sold one tonne of books

during the first hour of opening — that's \$2 000 worth of books! This year the sale is running for six days, the longest it has been held. Proceeds go towards providing new resources for Territory libraries.

CD-LINNET includes the collections of the Northern Territory Library (previously the State Reference Library — soon to be amalgamated with the Parliamentary Library), the secondary school and college libraries, all Territory public and community libraries, Central Library Service, and various government department libraries.

As a development of the LINNET Online Public Access Catalogue, CD-LINNET offers the enhanced capability of allowing users to search by individual library locations. Elsewhere around the Territory saw quiz nights held at Alice Springs and Tennant Creek Public Libraries, with Palmerston Library also holding a book sale.
