The Macquarie dictionary on CD-ROM

his is the electronic version of the second edition of *The Macquarie Dictionary* (1991), with over 100 000 entries and 300 000 definitions. The disc carries the entire printed text, including the Preface material as 'Background'. It s compatible with DOS, Windows and Macintosh, so that it is potentially a very flexible tool in an environment running mixed computers.


But if you already have a printed dictionary conveniently to hand, why would you want to pay a couple of hundred dollars for one that you have to use on your computer? Macquarie offer hree examples of applications hat would not be possible with a printed dictionary, but come put easily because you can search for any word or combination of words in the entire text (definitions, etymologies, etc) instead of being limited to the alphabetical listing of head-words:

its great for projects which re-

quire, say, looking for all words in current use that came from Aboriginal languages (search on 'aborig');

- you want the name of a pink flower but can't recall it (search on 'flowers pink');
- you're a keen crossword puz-

zler (or compiler) and stuck on a clue (you type in '?' for the missing letters and all words satisfying the search request are there instantly—your reviewer tested this with 'p??sb?t?r' and found the answer 'presbyter' in seconds).



Installation is quick and straightforward, although you may need to make sure that you have the latest software for your CD-ROM reader. Response times are quick, the screen layout is pleasing and search options are clearly displayed.

If you have an interest in words and language that goes beyond the straightforward use of a printed dictionary just to check spelling, or the meaning of a word, this CD-ROM is fun and enormously powerful. But you still need a printed dictionary for all the times when you aren't close to your computer and you need a simple answer *now*.
