One hundred years on and on the doorstep to the twenty first century is an ideal time to review where we have got to since then and where we are heading in the future. The conference theme *Reading the future*, gives us a framework to look forward without losing sight of tradition and heritage.

The conference will run from 8–10 October 1996, with pre- and post-conference sessions on 7 October and 11 October.
