The fifth international conference on scientometrics and informetrics will be held from 7–10 June 1995 at Rosary College, River Forest, Illinois.

International

The conference aim is to promote scientific communication between scientists and researchers engaged in these fields on all five continents. The field of scientometrics and informetrics, which includes the domain of bibliometrics, comprises several very closely-related and highly overlapping research areas.

The scope of these disciplines can be broadly defined as those topics that treat in quantitative fashion the measurement of scientific and scholarly enterprises, particularly including but not limited to publishing and library and library-like activities, and the measurement of the creation, flow, dissemination, and use of scholarly or and will offer practical advice on what is happening overseas; what new roles we can play and how to convince clients of the value and validity of these roles; traditional functions that will still be required (perhaps more than ever) and how we can extend or build on these foundations to offer new or improved information services.

We have chosen an award-winning venue, the Ramada Grand Hotel, on the Adelaide seafront. Trams for the city leave from outside the hotel which is also surrounded by some of the best shops and restaurants Adelaide has to offer. The beautiful Glenelg Esplanade is right outside. Optional wine tasting and shopping tours will also be available.

We are confident that you will leave the RAISS conference in 1995 with an idea of how to work towards your *Fantastic future*, and clear lungs from breathing only fresh sea-air for three days.
