

Information Science Section (ISS) (National)

ISS's 1995 activities commenced in January with the seventh *Australasian online and on disc conference* and exhibition, held in Sydney. The conference attracted 1337 delegates, and over 2000 people visited the exhibition at which 63 online and CD-ROM suppliers exhibited. *Information trails*, led by expert information professionals, gave an introduction to the online and CD-ROM industry and a free guided tour through the exhibition.

Keynote speakers were Reva Basch, author of the bestseller *Secrets of the super searchers*, Peter Jacso of the University of Hawaii, Lee Olsen and Patrick Teirney, CEO and president, Knight-Ridder Information Services.

The ISS and the National Library of Australia jointly sponsored a pre-conference seminar on electronic document delivery services. A post-conference seminar on *Empowering your PC for multime-*

dia, presented by Peter Jacso, was co-sponsored by the ISS.
