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Saving our past for our future

ave you ever thought about preserving cultural heritage and information about your community? Or what sort of message you will be leaving future generations about our world?

Our museums, libraries, archives, art galleries and individual collections provide a collective memory of a community's past. The cultural heritage and information stored in these institutions help us to understand the world around us. They tell us where we came from and what formed our values, and let us see how our political, economic and social systems have developed.

Local communities often hold a wealth of objects which need proper care if they are to survive. In the Mackay district, for example, a recent three-month pilot heritage conservation project surveyed ten local museum and library collections. Many items of cultural significance were found, including a flag of the Amalgamated Worker's Association which dated back to 1911; Aboriginal stone axe heads, grain grinding stones, and ceremonial carved trees; early diaries from Mackay district pioneer John Cook; an impressive toy collection from the historic

Greenmount Homestead; and a message book used in World War II by the 11th Squadron Leader, containing top secret messages.

As part of the pilot project, conservator Lynda Black advised local curators on how best to preserve heritage objects and what factors can lead to deterioration. She developed draft conservation strategies for each collection, and provided advice on a range of issues including collection management, staff training, storage and cleaning.

All over Australia, there are significant objects and collections in need of attention. On 30 October, the Conservation Working Party of the Heritage Collections Committee is holding a free public forum in Sydney to develop a national strategy to actively improve the conservation and preservation status of our cultural heritage collections.
