Call for assistance for awards funding

he Children's Book Council of Australia has established the Awards Foundation with the aim to raise \$1 million to fund the Children's Book of the Year awards. The Children's Book Council Children's Book of the Year Awards have done more for the development of children's books in Australia than anything else. The flow-on encouragement to authors, illustrators and publishers has had a profound effect on their success.

Camellias or cash

Fifty years ago, when the awards began, the prizes were a camellia if the winner was a woman, and a hearty handshake if the winner was a man. Funding from various sources over the years enabled monetary prizes to be awarded. Whether it is a reflection of the frugal nineties or an indication of stricter financial times, funding for the prizes is now unavailable. Raising \$1 million will secure funding for the prizes in perpetuity and will ensure the independence of the Children's Book Council and the integrity of the awards.
