## Melbourne librarians win research prize

The Anita Morawetz Research Prize

Proving that librarians make significant contributions in other fields, Mari Davis and Lorraine Lipson were awarded the 1995 Anita Morawetz Research Prize by the Victorian Association of Family Therapists for their bibliometric research in the field of family therapy.

They subsequently presented a paper entitled An overview of the structure and content of family therapy in Australasia: a bibliometric analysis of the first decade of the Australian and New Zealand journal of

family therapy at the fifth biennial conference of the International Society for Scientometrics and Informetrics in Chicago this year. An article based on this research will be published in a forthcoming issue of the Australian and New Zealand journal of family therapy.

Mari Davis works at the Australian Institute of Family Studies and is completing a PhD on interdisciplinarity and information use. Lorraine Lipson is the librarian at the Victorian College of Optometry and is also a trained social worker.

he Acquisitions Section throughout 1995 has continued to contribute to the professional development of library staff in the serials and acquisitions areas by providing a variety of events, including tours, talks, a demonstration and a seminar for the profession.

Our first event was Children's books trash or treasure held in March which provided an opportunity for Juliana Bayfield, the Manager of the Children's Literature Research Collection at the State Library, to share her wealth of knowledge and experience in all aspects of maintaining an internationally

recognised children's literature collection.

The tour of the paper restoration area of Artlab in June was well attended and provided a very valuable insight into the problems associated with the preservation of paper and, therefore, books.

The Acquisitions and Cataloguing Sections jointly supported a session by Professor Hirshon, called *Re-engineering technical services*, which was part of the National RAISS conference in August 1995.

The highlight of the year was the *E-Journals seminar* held on 13 October at the

Orphanage Teachers Centre attended by over 60 people. The conference covered all aspects of E-Journals including subscriptions, access, production, content and cataloguing.
