## A busy year for cataloguers

he Queensland Cataloguers Section Committee organised three activities in 1996, all held in the second half of the year.

On the evening of Monday 15 July a roundtable on cataloguing interactive multimedia was held. Over twenty people attended from Brisbane-based public libraries, TAFE libraries, tertiary institutions and the State Library. Discussion was led by three experienced multi-media cataloguers (Mary Gough, Jon Peak and Brian Reis) and centred on standards and difficulties, as well as touching on issues such as copyright.

On Thursday 10 October the Section held a seminar entitled 'Transforming Technical Services'. The speakers, Carolyn Young (Queensland University of Technology), Ann McLean (Brisbane City Council), and Jeanette Rosengren (Griffith University) outlined their recent experiences with technical services redesign and restructure. Eighty-three people at six sites throughout Queensland [Brisbane (two sites), Rockhampton, Mackay, Townsville, and Cairns] attended the seminar using the resources of the Queensland Open Learning Network. The format was similar to that of

a teleconference, with the addition of a Powerpoint display during the presentations. This was the first time the committee had tried presenting a seminar in this way, and the afternoon went smoothly.

Giles Martin from the University of Newcastle was the speaker at the final event of the year: *Dewey Decimal Classification: the new 21st edition,* on 18 November.

Our year's activities concluded with a presentation by doctoral candidate Rahmat Fattahi of his 'Super catalogue', a solution for the retrieval and display of works appearing in different manifestations and formats.
