Jenny McCarthy joined General Council in 1995 as the Queensland representative. Jenny joined ALIA in 1973, and has been involved in Queensland branch activities ever since.

In the late 1980s she was active in UCLS, serving as Queensland section president in 1989. Jenny is campus librarian, Kelvin Grove Campus of QUT. Prior to this she worked in the TAFE sector for 17 years, establishing and later managing the Queensland TAFE library network.

Jenny's experience in TAFE has given her a special interest in the needs of members working in remote locations and small libraries.
