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In the news

Highly educated, rat-cunning or parish-pump politician?

hese are the descriptions of the three types of ministers according to Ellnor Grassby, a flamboyant ex-politician in the ACT. Ms Grassby was a guest speaker at the *Lobby for libraries* seminar held for ALIA ACT Branch in December 1995. Her advice was humorous and straightforward, with a variety of possible actions for lobbying.

Her advice for approaching a Member of Parliament included:

- 1 Do your homework: get the party platform; identify the key people; ascertain if the Minister knows his portfolio; uncover the background of the Minister and determine type of Minister (as above) for appropriate approach; prepare a short clear simple submission of about a page and a half and target a particular issue.
- 2 Meet ahead of time: nominate a spokesperson; inform the Minister's office of the names and titles of those who will be attending the meeting.
- 3 At the meeting: expect a half-hour maximum; present the written brief and address

each of the issues in more detail; ensure you provide solutions to the problems. Make sure that the information is correct.

4 Follow-up: prepare a summary of the issues and the outcomes of discussion; provide the solutions with the summary or recommendations for further exploration; keep in touch with the Minister's staff; ensure that material is sent that could be used in Parliament; flatter!

Her final piece of advice was to ask politicians to make a statement in writing — perhaps in reply to a letter. The document could be strategically useful in future negotiations.

Ellnor also confirmed that she sewed all of her politician husband's ties — which certainly reflect her colourful personality.

The members of ALIA ACT Branch who attended the seminar found it valuable — not only for electoral issues, but in many other areas utilising presentation skills such as radio and television interviews. In summary, it was particularly useful for practical tips in dealing with politicians and the media in an informed and effective manner.

Librarians lobbying locally

lobbying workshop, presented by Virginia Walsh, at Westmead hospital for thirty librarians was very well-received by participants. The presentation was professional and focused on aspects of particular interest to librarians involved in lobbying.

The workshop was enhanced by the inclusion of a politician, Mark Latham, member for Werriwa, who delivered a succinct and extremely relevant presentation on the issues to be considered when talking to

politicians. This was further enhanced by the presentation of the ALIA video on lobbying which addressed in an amusing but very considered way, the rights and wrongs of media presentations.

Virginia's presentation was very polished and obviously based on an in-depth knowledge of the lobbying arena. Perhaps the only criticism was the lack of time available to workshop some of the issues with the participants. As it was, the brief discussions which involved the participants

brought out some local issues which were very useful to the audience.

I would encourage ALIA to continue the workshops across Australia and to, as is intended, involve local presenters. I would stress that the inclusion of a sympathetic local politician is a necessary addition to the workshop, as a way of ensuring relevance to the particular geographic area in which the lobbying is being conducted.
