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### Your key to the salary maze

Indications are that the coming year will see intensified pressure on salaries and wages, making reliable salary data more necessary than ever.

The 1996 Library and information work and salary survey, conducted by Library Locums, is the largest survey of librarians in the private sector in Australia. It contains salary information based on data gathered from two-hundred-and-sixty organisations and five-hundred-and-forty-three employees in the library and information sector across four States. The number of responses is thirty per cent higher than in 1995 and the library supply sector is covered for the first time.

**Key findings** 

Basic full-time Salaries range from \$13 040–\$90 000 compared to a range of \$16 500–\$85 000 in the 1995 survey. The overall median is \$38 000 compared with \$36 000 in 1995.

The median point for first year library and information management graduates is \$29 189. This result places library and information management graduates in the top ten graduate starting salaries, above education graduates, according to the Graduate Careers Council of Australia.

Results show that critical factors influencing library and information salaries are:

Qualifications, expecially in management.
 Survey respondents with additional qualifications in management earn forty-one per cent more than respondents without non-library subject qualifications.

• Number of staff supervised.

Only six per cent of respondents lead teams of five or more and their median salary is \$60 000 — or thirty-three per cent more than the median salary for librarians in charge of a one-person information service.

The survey examines not only what people earn but also what people do for the money they are paid. It looks in detail at the duties performed by librarians in charge, librarians, library technicians and library assistants.
