'Funds marked to establish new library'

The ACT Government has set aside almost \$2 million for the establishment of a new library in Gungahlin. The new library is in response to the recent review of the ACT library service. There will be a feasibility study undertaken later this year to evaluate the needs of the community and the construction is likely to be completed by 1998–1999.

'Getting serious at lifting service'

With the advent of new technologies, libraries are looking for new solutions, new information products and services that will provide what customers want. 'Database vendors hit hard by the Internet'

Kevin Shinkle reports that the Internet has really rocked the world of the large US database vendors who find articles they once charged \$20 to supply are now available free on the Internet. Online archives used to be the premier source for business publications and research, and charged steep rates for their services. Now on-line information outlets are sprouting as fast as companies can set up Internet sites.

However, it is expected that big clients will keep paying premium rates for somebody else to do their searching and the most likely solution for database companies will be to cut prices and hope volume makes up the lost revenue. Some analysts also predict that librarians could become dinosaurs themselves, Mary Kennedy, corporate librarian at Digital Equipment Corp disagrees she believes that information overload makes her role as a gatekeeper more valuable for cost-minded companies.

'VDL Co archive sale fury'

The 'priceless' archive of Tasmania's historic Van Diemen's Land Company is the centre of controversy with the New Zealand owners planning to sell the collection next month. Dating from the mid-1820s, the company owned collection is housed in the State Archive. It forms a unique record of white settlement in the far North-West of Tasmania. Despite talks between the State government and the company a government spokeswoman has said that Tasmania could not afford the \$1 million price tag put on the archive by the company.

The next day in a letter to the editor, Andrew Parsons, secretary, ALIA Northern Areas Regional Group, asked the company to reconsider its planned auction on the collection. He says in his letter 'Even today the collection is of national importance and is used by many researchers from around the State. The folly of losing it would be little understood or appreciated by future generations of Tasmanians'.


