Our website, ALIAnet, is a' weaving


here is a growing interest and understanding in the potential for web-publishing via ALIAnet, with ALIA's branches, sections and special interest groups making more information globally available to their members. The benefit for even the smallest of the Association's groups is access to members across Australia — in a short period of time, and at virtually no cost. From contact details, to a list of activities for the year, or publishing of the monthly newsletter, ALIAnet is a convenient and paperless way of transmitting information anywhere on the Internet.

March and April heralded the revamping of the Western Australian and Queensland Branch home pages, with the Queensland Branch's newsletter *Quill* also receiving a face-lift. Other areas of the ALIAnet site that were revamped and streamlined were the publications and 'what's new' pages.

Activity is not just occurring at the branch level but also via many of ALIA's sections and special interest groups as well. Special interest groups like the Rural and Isolated Libraries (RILSIG), Asia and Pacific (APSIG) and One-Person Australian Libraries (OPAL) are all very active in promoting their activities. On a section level, the Library Technicians have a national home page which links the pages for the Tasmania, New South Wales, the Australian Capital Territory, and the Northern Territory groups. This is just one section which is tying together its branches across Australia to offer a unified voice to its members, as well as an awareness about itself to the wider library and information sector.

ALIAnet was also the launch-pad for the new-look *Australian Library Journal* which in April joined the world of dual paper-digital publications. The *ALJ* pages [http://www.alia.org.au/alj.html] provide the essence of the last four editions with full contents listings, introductions to each article, editorials and a list of book reviews. These pages provide a great introductory read to *ALJ* and give new readers the chance to gain an idea of the exciting breadth of library and information issues ALIA's premier journal tackles.

On a purely statistical plane, ALIAnet is a vibrant site for the announcement of library and information sector job vacancies and events. Since November, seventeen advertisements have appeared on ALIAnet's job vacancy page, ALIAppointments [at http://www.alia.org.au.aliappointments.html], taking advantage of larger workforce market than regional newspapers offer. The events [http://www.alia.org.au/events.html] page



also continues to be a popular browsing spot with all states and territories posting many events and activities. The benefit of the event's page is a national focus that allows the Association's divisions to co-ordinate and announce Australia-wide library and information activities on the one site.

ALIAnet users are now more confident in their use of electronic forms to either add or ask for information via ALIAnet. Some of the forms offered include a *Vital Link* update form, which allows members to quickly and painlessly update contact details for our *Vital Link* publication; a form requesting 1997 Australian Library Week publicity material; and a membership application request form. In March we upgraded the information and content of our Listserv pages (an area to which we will continue to add information). Listservs are electronic mailing lists that allow those who wish to discuss issues as part of a group to subscribe to a distributed mailing list. All subscribers can then read all messages sent to the list by any member of that group. Messages are delivered automatically by the Listserv software to all subscribers.
