retired members I sympathise with Leila Hoffman (inCite, April 1997, p5). Some twenty or more years ago I suggested to the Association that they should follow the practice of some other professional bodies in allowing long standing members who had reached retiring age to continue as members without charge. This was adopted, except that no retiring age was specified and the requisite number of years was ten. Many left the profession with ten years of service but without reaching retiring age, and many retired with ten years of service, and the numbers made the scheme financially unviable. There is now the anomaly that I, who retired after over forty years as a professional member retain my professional membership, while others, who entered the profession at the same time, but retired later, do not.

Once one has spent a lifetime in libraries one likes to keep in

I do this through Friends of libraries groups, and through receiving copies of inCite; I am enabled to keep in touch with library affairs generally, and this assists in the contribution I can make to the groups to which 1 belong. People like Leila Hoffman have studied to gualify for professional membership, have been employed as librarians, and have done a great deal of voluntary work for the Association.
