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Re-developing Monash

s in the 19th century Victorian goldrush, there is a sense of big things happening nowadays at the Monash Department of Librarianship, Archives and Records.

Semester 2 1997 will see the launch of an innovative degree option — the Master of Information Management (MIM), offered in distance education mode. Appropriately qualified information professionals in librarianship, recordkeeping or related fields are accorded advanced standing, allowing course completion in the equivalent of one year full-time instead of two. Development of the distance education Masters course has been led by Associate Professor Sue McKemmish.

The Department's Head is Professor Don Schauder. Don was formerly university librarian of RMIT, and was a co-founder both of INFORMIT Electronic Publishing, and of VICNET — Victoria's network.

Through adoption of flexible learning approaches, the Department offers ever widening opportunities for studying either in on campus or distance mode, or a combination of both. The Monash programs are now based as strongly on information technology as on social sciences and humanities. The Department has become the cornerstone of the Faculty's new undergraduate Bachelor of Information Management degree.

The Bachelor of Information Management has been a notable success story, with steadily increasing demand both from school-leavers

and mature-age students, local and international. A fourth year — BIM (Honours) — will be offered for the first time in 1998. The Department's first double degree, the four-year BA/BIM program, allows students to bridge worlds of thought in humanities and computing that were formerly all too separated.

At Graduate Diploma and Master's level too, new ground is being broken. In 1996, the important decision was made to move the distance-education teacher librarianship graduate diploma program from Monash Gippsland to Monash Clayton. The coursework-based Master of Information Management (MIM) has replaced the Department's former MA offerings, and the MLib is being superseded by the research-based MIM, or direct entry to PhD.

All Graduate Diploma programs in the Department have now been re-designed, with advice from a strong committee of librarianship, recordkeeping and other information professionals, chaired by Fay Nicholson.

The Department is actively developing closer relationships with other Departments in the Faculty of Computing and Information Technology, and also with a wide range of other schools of information studies in Australia and internationally.
