

# International award for an information studies student

**K**aren Hilzinger, a part-time student enrolled in the Bachelor of Applied Science in Information Studies in the Department of Information, Studies at University of Technology, Sydney, has been awarded the 1996 Margaret McKinley Memorial Student Scholarship competition sponsored by the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Society for Information Science.

The award is in honour of the late Margaret McKinley who was head of the University Research Library at the University of California, Los Angeles. This competition, established in 1952, was designed to encourage students who are members of ASIS to further their professional development by attending the annual conference in the USA.

Karen, who is Manager of Information Services at Corporate Decisions Executive Information Research, Sydney, presented a submission based on the benefits of participation in the activities of professional societies. In her submission, she spoke of Australia as a 'geographically isolated infocosm', and saw her need to develop a comparative understanding of international issues such as information democracy, freedom of information, information privacy, and information policy.

Karen's prize includes re-imbusement of US \$1000 to attend the annual meeting of the American Society of Information Science in Baltimore, Maryland in October 1996, as well as one year's membership of ASIS and a years subscription to the *Journal of the*

*American Society of Information Science*, one of the most prestigious journals in the field.

The American Society for Information Science is a non-profit professional association organised for scientific, literary and educational pursuits dedicated to the creation, organisation, dissemination and application of knowledge concerning information and its transfer. It was founded in 1937 as the American Documentation Institute and became the American Society for Information Science in 1968. It has a diverse membership representing a broad array of professionals working in the frontiers of information science and technology. Members work in such fields as computer science, librarianship, management, engineering, chemistry, linguistics and education. Research activities of the Association focus on the search for new and better theories, techniques and technologies to improve access to information through storage and retrieval advances. The Association also contributes to determining new directions and standards for the development of information policies and practices. ■
