We caught our clients in our web as soon as they entered the library with a wonderful display in the foyer of an information seeker climbing a huge net which had also ensnared various books and resources on related topics such as spiders, netball, knots anything at all to do with webs and nets.

Colourful bunches of official library week balloons also adorned the display as well as this year's posters.

The first ten students to borrow materials each day were presented with official Australian Library Week bookmarks and these soon became precious collector's items as the week progressed.

To add a fun di-

mension and to lure the more reluctant users into the library we also ran a 'Where's Wally?' competition, where twenty small Wally cut-outs were hidden in various parts of the library — peeping out of books, on the inside lid of the photocopier, and tucked into the edge of a poster.

I really only expected the younger students to participate in this competition, assuming that the older girls would be too 'cool' to be seen exploring every nook and cranny of the library, but it is amazing what Year 12s will do for chocolate Freddo Frogs — especially boarding students — and an extremely positive spin-off for them was discovering resources they never knew the library possessed!

Reluctant to have the staff miss out I ran a 'Who's a Wally' competition for them where they were encouraged to confess to an act of silliness on their behalf or dob in a friend or relative. Here is an example of their responses:
