Sad loss for Queensland libraries

he Queensland Department of Primary Industries lost a valuable staff member on 14 June when Dr Christine Cannon passed away suddenly at her home, aged only 52.

Chris started work in the Department of Primary Industry as a librarian at Indooroopilly and many officers remember her as being hard working and very obliging. Nothing was too much trouble for Chris. She was a much liked and highly respected colleague and friend to many of the staff at the Department of Primary Industry.

At one stage Chris was acting librarian in charge of the Department of Primary Industry library service. Chris took the opportunity of a new career move into extablishing the FoodInfo

service at the Centre for Food Technology in 1993 and became well-known to many in the wider food industry for her friendliness, reliablity and efficiency.

Chris would have preferred to be Queensland's first zoo librarian but unfortunately the zoo did not eventuate.

Chris completed her PhD in Zoology at the University of Queensland. Her research topic on parrots involved a lot of field work, some of it undertaken at the Currumbin Bird Sanctuary. She was head of the wildlife unit at Currumbin for some time. As opportunities to pursue a career in biology were limited, Christine made a career change and became a librarian, bring-

ing a wealth of scientific knowledge with her when she joined the Department of Primary Industries libraries at Indooroopilly.

Chris was also a major force behind the new Department of Primary Industries Infosearch service, a customised information search service for Queensland's primary industries, completing the implementation report shortly before her death.

With her knowledge of the Queensland food industry and information sources, her network of colleagues, skills in retrieving information, analytical, methodical, innovative approach to her work, and openness to new ideas, Chris is irreplaceable, and will be deeply missed.
