Kakoda Trail joins information super highway

he government of Papua New Guinea is now surfing the information super highway and nattering on the net thanks to close collaboration between the National Library of Australia and the Papua New Guinea Office of Libraries and Archives.

The project was completed in time to enable the Office of Libraries and Archives to take immediate advantage of Internet satellite facilities when they came on stream for the first time in June. Papua New Guinea's first international e-mail using the new Internet satellite link was sent by Daniel Paraide, the national librarian, to the director-general of the National Library of Australia, Warren Horton.

This message was the culmination of months of planning, negotiation, training and technical installation. With the help of the National Library of Australia, the Office of Libraries and Archives is the first government agency in Papua New Guinea to gain access to e-mail and the world wide web and to have its own home page. The proposal to connect Papua New Guinea to the Internet was developed last year by the National Library of Australia in response to concern expressed by librarians in that country over their lack of access to the Internet.

As the technological leader in the provision of access to networked information in Papua New Guinea, it is expected that the Office of Libraries and Archives will facilitate the availability of Internet access to citizens throughout the country through school and public libraries. Universities and government departments in Papua New Guinea plan to draw upon the Office of Libraries and Archive's newly acquired skills to establish their own Internet access facilities and home pages.

Networking communities conference

call has gone out for potential speakers and workshop organisers to take part in a major conference on low-cost electronic community networking.

The Third Communities Networking/Networking/Communities Conference is being hosted by the Victorian Association of Community Information Centres and the Victoria University of Technology, and will take place on 27–28 February 1998 at the Victoria University of Technology St Albans Campus in Melbourne.

The conference aims to bring together a diverse range of people to learn about practical and theoretical issues in electronic community networking; to establish an on-going coordinating structure in Victoria and to set up an on-going electronic forum on the world wide web.

Proposed themes for papers include issues around access; adult, community and further education; community development and organisation; gender and electronic networking; training for electronic access; the role of public libraries in electronic networking; government, community and business partnerships; technological innovations that assist in electronic community networking; content regulation and management of community networks; and political economy, policy, planning, research and evaluation of community networking.
