he Queen's Trust is a philanthropic trust which began in 1977 (the Jubilee Year) and provides grant support and leadership programs for young Australians. This year I was fortunate enough to be selected to attend the 'Future perspectives' youth forum which was held in Melbourne from 6–12 July. I was nominated by my ALIA colleague, Beth Mayo and my nomination was seconded by the assistant auditor-general at the Queensland Audit Office. I was successful with my application and interview and was one of fourteen participants selected from Queensland.

At the forum 100 young Australians, aged between 23 and 30, and from a wide range of occupations were brought together to discuss issues facing the future of our country. Eminent speakers talked to us on subjects such as the environment, our economy, Asia, our national identity, drugs, crime and imprisonment. Other speakers talked about personal experiences of terminal illness, incest and racism. Participants also visited a correctional centre. Throughout the week we also got together in syndicate groups of ten people to discuss what we had heard, talk about our own situations and opinions, and to think about possible solutions and how we can contribute to society.

It was a very challenging and rewarding week full of discussions and debate about the difficult, complex and often disturbing problems of our society. It was a great opportunity to focus on issues that are not a part of a librarian's 'everyday' experience. The speakers were of a very high calibre and the program was well structured so that each speaker and topic built on the last to complete the big picture. Meeting the other participants who were all achievers in their field was also a wonderful experience. Much of what I heard and experienced were situations and issues that were out of my 'comfort zone' but I feel that I now have a better understanding of these problems and how individuals and groups can make a difference.

It is important that information professionals take part in these types of leadership and community programs. We need to be involved and represented. Next time you hear about one of these programs nominate a colleague!
