#### Library staff surf the Internet

Suzanne Newton, from the Internet Training Institute, said recently that there is a need to teach people how to best navigate the net. Ms Newton was in Bathurst to help organise the establishment of the Bathurst City Library as an accredited Internet Training Centre.

Bathurst is the first inland centre in New South Wales to boast a training centre approved by the Internet Training Institute. The training will encompass both introductory courses in using the internet and more advanced courses teaching people how to search for specific subjects. Ros Dorsman, Bathurst city librarian said that the Internet had already proved popular at the library, attracting peoplewho would probably not normally go there.

## Library upgrade in state TAFE

TAFE Queensland will spend \$5.6 million this financial year to upgrade its library system. The new system will link all the TAFE Queensland libraries in a single state-wide catalogue.

## **Internet van grant sought** *Hamilton Spectator*, 7 August 1997

Glenelg Regional Library is seeking a \$100 000 grant to give residents in the outlying areas of Southern Grampians and Glenelg shires access to the Internet. The money would be used to buy a transit van fitted out with computers. It would have the ability to access power points and telephones in remote areas and smaller centres. The first application for funds from Vicnet and Multi Media Victoria were rejected, but another application will be made in October.

### Council proud of Lestricia News Mail (Bundaberg),

11 August 1997

Library assistant Lestricia Little is set to compete for Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student of the Year after completing a twelve month traineeship with Bundaberg City Council. Ms Little completed the traineeship in the council's library before beating more than sixty applicants for a full-time job as a library assistant. Ms Little said she never expected to work in a library, but now says it is a really good job. She said the traineeship helped her to learn new skills, upgrade her current skills and exposed her to new technology, including the Internet.

## Libraries hit by swing to hi-tech

The library, the first of its kind in Australia, can carry up to 20 000 books donated from publishing houses throughout the nation, as well as offering CD-ROM, audio and Internet access.

# Library services review to follow overseas study tour

A shake-up of library services in the Tumut Shire has been proposed by li-

brarian Lyn Quince in a bid to strengthen the partnership between libraries and the community. One of the most significant changes would be the introduction of a mobile library service to the region.

Speaking to the Council on her return from a fact-finding trip to England, Ireland and Canada, sponsored by the inaugural Blakeney Millar Churchill Fellowship, Mrs Quince said a mobile library would be linked to future planning and needs assessment of the shire.

Other proposals include providing free access to the Internet, establishing an interactive home page, and enlarging rate notices by photocopier free of charge for the visually impaired.

#### Funding shocker
