Novocastrian Tales (Elephant Press, Paul F Walsh, Ed, ISBN 0 646 32308 3) is a bicentenary gift for the people of Newcastle and the Hunter region, and spans the history of Newcastle and the Hunter from before white settlement to the future through a rare blend of documents, fiction, faction, poetry, and pure entertainment.

Authors include Phillip Adams, John Bell, Julian Croft, John Doyle (also known as Rampaging Roy Slaven), Nick Enright, Judith Fox, Marion Halligan, Nigel Krauth, Donna Meehan, Les Murray, John O'Donoghue, Mickey Robins, Yahoo Serious, Michael Stephens, Kate Walter and Paul F Walsh. The preface is by E G Whitlam.

All proceeds from *Novocastrian tales* are being donated to the establishment of an

Aboriginal accommodation centre in the bushland of Newcastle's John Hunter Hospital. Yallarwah home will provide accommodation for the families of Aboriginal patients who are in health crisis. Yallarwah Home will serve all the Aboriginal communities of Northern New South Wales. It is believed to be the first establishment of its kind in Australia

For every dollar raised by sales of *Novocastrian tales* the New South Wales State Government has pledged to contribute a further three dollars to the building of Yallarwah Home, up to a ceiling of \$300 000. The building will cost \$420 000. *Novocastrian Tales* will be the book that built a building when twelve thousand copies are sold nationally.

Link-up newsletter now replaced by electronic discussion list

he National Library of Australia's publication *Link-up* has been replaced by an electronic mailing list due to receive its first postings at the end of September.

The linkup-l discussion list is designed to foster networking at the grassroots level among libraries concerned with service provision in the special interest areas of cultural diversity, literacy and disability. As well as creating a forum for discussion, it will host occasional 'news releases' in the

form of specifically commissioned articles. In addition, an archive on the National Library of Australia's World Wide Web server is being developed for some of the list contributions.
