
Hey Look Out!

Who's where

New librarian at Deakin University

Sue McKnight has been appointed as Deakin University librarian. She has held five positions within the library since joining Deakin in 1990 and has been acting in the position since Professor Margaret Cameron's retirement.

Sue came to Victoria from Queensland where she held a senior position at the University of Queensland Libraries. She has also worked in special and public libraries.

In 1994 Sue became president of the Victorian Branch Council and has been twice president of the Geelong Regional Group. She is currently the Victorian State president of ACLIS and will continue to promote the close working relationship that the Victorian branches of ACLIS and ALIA have fostered in recent years. She is also vice-chair of the Australian Institute of Management in Geelong.

Deakin Deputy Vice-chancellor (Academic), Professor Daryl Le Grew said that Sue brings a wealth of experience to the position. Her work in reshaping the organisational structure and budget for the library had transformed it into a multi-campus library system rather than a collection of campus libraries.

Sue plans to build on the excellent services already offered by the library. Under her guidance the academic community and the profession can be assured that the Deakin University Library will continue to offer appropriate and innovative services and will be well-placed to meet the challenges of the twenty-first century.

In brief

Alison Crook recently resigned as director-general of the New South Wales Department of State and Regional Development. She plans to take a short holiday before looking for another position. Ms Crook gives her reason for resigning as an interest in entering the private sector, where, she believes, the challenge for the future lies. Alison joined the government after twelve years at the State Library, where she was state librarian for seven years.

Dr Anne Clyde has been promoted to professor in the Faculty of Social Science at the University of Iceland. In 1997, in addition to teaching information technology and information retrieval courses in the Library and Information Science program at the University

of Iceland, she will spend three months in Namibia as international consultant on a 'library without walls' project sponsored by the African Development Bank, and a month in Canada teaching a summer course at the University of British Columbia.

The manager of the New-castle Region Library, Chris Williams, has been appointed director of library and information services with the State Library of New South Wales. Chris will be responsible for the New South Wales public library network and the public reference library. Other responsibilities will be the legal information access service, health information, and the development of multicultural services.
