Do we judge a book by its cover?

he Library and Information Service of Western Australia's beautiful and successful exhibition, *Judging a book by its cover* is now available to other libraries around Australia.

Twenty-three Western Australian books were chosen for their cover designs, and the authors, designers and publishers were asked for their impressions regarding these covers. The result is a fascinating insight into the world of publishing.

The exhibition shows tremendous diversity — not only are books by such well-known and award-winning authors as Dorothy Hewett, Elizabeth Jolley, Glyn Parry and Mudrooroo shown, but first-time authors, self-published authors and historians are also part of the exhibition. The exhibition features novels, non-fiction books, biographies and children's literature, and some of the original artwork is on display.

The Orchard thieves, by Elizabeth Jolley, is one of the books featured. What the author says: 'The artist, Rosanna Vecchio, has covered *The Orchard thieves* with the richness and the remembered warmth of childhood. When I first held the book in my hand it seemed to glow and it still glows. The cover pleases immediately.'

What the illustrator says: 'The restraints of working within

a set brief didn't exist. Instead, I was lead by the emotional tones of the book, and by my own emotional response to Elizabeth's novel, as a reader.'

What the publisher, Viking/Penguin Australia, says: 'The central, stylised image of the tree is obviously taken from the book's title and has a simplicity and warmth and also a hint of mystery, which works well with the title. The design of the cover reflects this esteemed author's standing in Australian letters, giving prominence to her name.'

There are two sets of twenty-four panels available to other libraries around Australia should they wish to exhibit them. LISWA will meet the cost of shipping the panels to any destination in Australia with the return freight to be paid by the exhibiting library.
