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A round-up of ALW98 activities

ustralian Library Week 98, Libraries: pathways to knowledge was a great success with activities organised all over Australia to celebrate libraries and the professionals who staff them. We received reports from groups all over the country.

As part of a truly national event, the Special Libraries section's national committee placed an advertisement in the *Business Review Weekly*, cover date 27 April 1998 to promote special libraries and Australian Library Week. The committee chose to use the

'Incredible library' poster which has created much discussion among the profession. 'Corporate libraries providing information to your business' was the headline that was used with the poster. The advertisement appeared in the issue which featured the 'Top-500 companies' list and was on sale for the two weeks leading up to Australian Library Week.

According to Deanne Barrett, president of the section, the decision to place an advertisement in a national business journal was a major commitment and undertaking for the national committee. 'We wanted to target a wider audience and to raise awareness of special libraries outside the library profession', Deanne said. The national committee is still collecting feedback from special libraries regarding what impact the advertisement had, and whether it achieved their aims. The national committee believes the advertisement was a great initiative and the first step in the ongoing process of marketing special libraries to the business community.

Western Australia

Sandra Wilson, president of the **Western Australian Library Technician's Section** reported that the section held an Australian Library Week dinner at Rosie O'Grady's on 7 May with guest speakers, John Arfield (University of Western Australia) and Shirley Cowcher, Information Enterprises addressing the topic 'The role of library technicians in creating the pathways to knowledge'. Shirley Cowcher, who featured in the Australian Library Week calendar *Librarians in focus*, gave some encouraging predictions about career opportunities for library technicians.

The Western Australian Local Studies section arranged a tour of Fairbridge Village (the home of Fairbridge Farm School); Alcoa-Murray Public Library; lunch at the Heritage Tearooms at Edenvale (formerly the McLarty fam-

ily home); and a visit to another McLarty property, Old Blythwood, now managed by the National Trust. Fairbridge still exudes a sense of the practical idealism that spurred his efforts to create a new future for underprivileged British children. Later, at the impressive public library in Pinjarra, one of the former 'Fairbridge kids' gave his personal impressions of life there as a child in the 1930s. John Lane says 'for most of us Old Fairbridgeans, we were the rescued children. It gave us a life. We would never have had a life back in England.'

Librarian of the Alcoa-Murray Public Library, Lorraine Hume, and her assistant Gloria Withers not only gave up their Sunday morning to show the visitors around the library, but baked baskets of scones for morning tea. Their local studies collection is growing steadily. They have developed strong links with the Murray District Aboriginal Association and have started an oral history program. Jenni Woodroffe writes 'that as visitors to Pinjarra, the group felt privileged to be shown so much evidence of local studies alive and well and flourishing in beautiful surroundings. Sunday 3 May 1998 was a delightful and eye-opening day for us.'

According to Helen Gishubl from the City of Perth library 'Discovering your library in the City' wasn't difficult for commuters during ALW98. The City of Perth Library set up shop, temporarily, at the Train Station concourse. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday library staff distributed bookmarks with details of the library and its services. A large sign decorated with Australian Library Week balloons proclaimed the library's name, location and opening hours. A demonstration CD-ROM, The way things work, attracted considerable attention from all ages. Back at the library the atmosphere was also highly-charged. Two footballers from the Fremantle Dockers, a local AFL team, spent an hour chatting to customers and



checking up on football facts. A display of football posters and other paraphernalia, Australian Library Week balloons and books and videos on skills, training and the history of Australian Rules Football created a focal point for this special occasion.

Shoulder massage, volleyball, live bands, competitions and a bang-up breakfast to kick it all off. These are some of the fun ways the Learning Resource Centres (LRC) at **Central TAFE** were promoted during ALW98, reports Alexandra Dailakis. There was also the intellectual challenges of a Reuters demonstration, and world wide web and UnCover training.

Central TAFE also ran a number of competitions including designing the LRCs webpage, for which there was a \$500 prize sponsored by Ameritech Library Services. Dylan Buckee and Andreas Rehak, two up-and-coming graphic design students took out the award. As well, ALIA provided a free membership as a prize for the best library display using the theme *Pathways to knowledge*. Ana Puga and Marie White were the lucky winners.

The breakfast kick-off was sponsored by the college corporate executive with the keynote speaker, honorary consul, Roger Blake delivering the speech 'The use of modern technologies at institutions of learning: a Canadian perspective', on behalf of Joyce Barrett, the director of the Canadian Education Centre in Canberra. The world wide web and UnCover training was accentuated during the week as part of the growing information literacy classes provided by the school librarians. Raelene Sweetman of Reuters provided the demonstration of Reuters Business Briefing.

New South Wales

The librarians at **Gadens Lawyers** in Sydney, usually celebrate ALW with a special morning tea — the way to a lawyer's heart is definitely via the stomach, according to Margaret Williams. This year, library staff put Gadens memorabilia on display in the meeting room so that everyone could drift between the scones, the pastries and the archives. Local MP Murray Thompson and state treasurer Alan Stockdale lent a hand checking in and checking out items to borrowers according to Karyn Siegmann.

The City of Greater Dandenong Libraries celebrated with a live, on-line short-story writing workshop with author Tom Petsinis. The workshop was conducted as part of the 1998 Greater Dandenong Short Story Competition and Literary Fest. Using web-based internet chat program with private room access, Tom Petsinis, prominent playwright and novelist, was able to talk and share his experiences with participants located in libraries across Australia. These included City of Stirling Libraries in Western Australia, Darwin Public Libraries in Northern Territory and Newcastle Region Library in New South Wales. Tom answered numerous questions about short-story writing throughout this fast-paced, one and a half hour session.



A brief guide to short story writing was also made available for event participants to download from the City of Greater Dandenong Libraries website prior to the event. The event

was organised by Kylie Peckham, an electronic information librarian with the City of Greater Dandenong Libraries. The introduction of electronic information librarians has enabled the library service to become innovative in the area of electronic information service delivery.

Cathy Miller from the State Library of Victoria was part of the organising committee for the '**Great libraries of Melbourne' tour**. The tour celebrates the role of libraries, their place in Melbourne's history, and the architecture of four of the most significant libraries in Melbourne: the Athenaeum Library (established 1839), the Library of the Parliament of Victoria (established 1851), the Supreme Court Library (established 1852), and the State Library

of Victoria (established 1856). Planning for the tour program began in December 1997, with representatives of the four libraries meeting regularly to discuss the itinerary, the catering, and the publication of a flier and brochure. Each 'great library' supplied a senior librarian to speak to the tour groups, and group leaders to accompany each of the four groups. The tourists were universally enthusiastic about libraries and fascinated by this unique insight into the cultural history of Melbourne. The tour really was a celebration of libraries, and the response was so great that a second 'Great libraries tour' was conducted on 1 June.

Library staff at the **Bendigo Re**gional Institute of TAFE extrapolated

this year's theme - Libraries: pathways to knowledge... the journey never ends. The library was decorated with scenes from The wizard of Oz and library staff dressed as characters from the film for a day. The foyer of the building was transformed into Kansas and users entered the library by following a yellow brick road under a rainbow. They were led into the 'land of Oz' via a cornfield, Dorothy's house, Emerald City, the haunted forest and the Wicked Witch's Castle. Staff and students from the Institute's carpentry, painting and decorating harness racing; and hairdressing departments assisted with the displays. The week of celebration was well-received by staff and students and attracted coverage in the local newspaper and television.

South Australia

Deciding that a week was just not long enough, Renya Spratt and the rest of the staff from the **Marion Library Service** started celebrating Australian Library Week a little early. Mary Wilson from the Delta Foundation, started the celebrations rolling on 29 April, when she held an inspiring workshop at the Hallett Cove Branch on establishing book clubs. On 1 May, Marion Library's newlyformed 'Friends' group held its first formal function, a quiz night. More than 185 people attended the fun-filled night and the group raised approximately \$1200 for the library service.
