The speakers will be Associate Professor Maxine Rochester, from Charles Sturt University, Dr Rochester is also a member of the IFLA Education Forum; Barbara Paton a research librarian from La Trobe University; and Dr Angela Bridgland, associate librarian, Management and Development Services at the University of Melbourne.

Dr Rochester will talk about *Research*, education and librarianship now and in the future. She will outline the major research efforts underway and the issues that educators will have to face to respond to the challenges of the workplace and technology.

Barbara Paton will provide a view of research from a practitioner's perspective and how it operates in the workplace. Job descriptions at La Trobe include a research brief and Barbara will discuss the implications and practicalities of this role.

Dr Angela Bridgland will discuss the needs and training of staff and the implications for management to help them pursue research in her organisation. There have been some practical examples of research done at Melbourne and Angela will share their experiences.
