The human aspects of telecommunication

ecently the Telecommunications Needs Research Group (TNRG) moved from Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT) to the School of Information Management and Systems (at Monash University). The Group consists of Dr Kirsty Williamson, the director, and two research associates, Amanda Bow and Solveiga Saule. Dr Patricia Gillard, who was director of the group from 1993 until earlier this year remains as senior research fellow.

The TNRG started life as the Telecommunications Policy Research Group (TPRG) in 1991 in the Faculty of Social Sciences and Communications at RMIT. Dr Kirstv Williamson was a member of the group (with Dr Mark Balnaves and Dr Peter Caputi) in this embryonic stage. In 1993 Associate Professor Patricia Gillard became director and changed the name to TNRG. This reflected the emphasis on user research, which became the hallmark of the group.

Between 1992 and 1996 the Group was mainly supported by the Telstra Fund for Social and Policy Research — receiving almost \$500 000 from the Fund. The research undertaken with this funding focused on the human aspects of telecommunications. Research projects included: 'Older adults and their barriers to internet use in public libraries'; 'Young adults and their experiences of the internet in internet cafés in Melbourne'; 'Teenagers and their relationships with information and communication technologies'; and 'The relationships of users to their phones'.

The Group's discipline-base spans the information and communications fields, specifically, and the social sciences, in general. We are particularly interested in how people construct meanings with regard to the role of telecommunications in their everyday lives.

Our empirical work has aimed to develop an understanding of 'what is happening now' (and what might happen in the near future), based on what people do and say. Our research is broadly 'ethnographic' but has also included large-scale sample surveys.

The TNRG has recently become involved in research concerning online services for people with disabilities. With Vicnet (State Library of Victoria), it won the contract to develop the website for the @ccessability Program for Online Access for People with Disabilities, which is under the auspices of the National Office of the Information Economy (NOIE). The Group is also a major partner in a consortium which has been funded by @ccessability, to undertake a project entitled: 'Online services for people with disabilities in Australian public libraries'. The consortium received one of the three largest grants, recently announced (\$120 004). Matching funding of \$180 000, principally from another major partner, the State Library of Victoria (through Multimedia Victoria), brings a total funding package of \$300 000. Almost all the money from the NOIE grant is for research, which the Group will undertake over a two-year period. The future looks bright!
